Dear Mr. Walker:

Please allow this letter to serve as a follow up to my telephone message of Friday, September 17, 2010. Your Pauper's Affidavit filed with the court on March 15, 2010, specifically requested that you be relieved of paying filing fees associated with your Notice of Appeal dated March 10, 2010 and filed in our office on March 15, 2010. Subsequently, Judge Murphy Miller executed an Order relieving you of paying costs associated with that appeal. The record was transmitted and the Court of Appeals dismissed your appeal. In light of this, any future appeal will have to be treated as a new action. I enclose a Notice of Trial Court Costs which reflects the cost associated with transmitting the record to the Court of Appeals. Please note that due to House Bill 1055 which went in to effect on May 12, 2010, the cost of preparing the record has increased from \$1.50 per page to \$10.00 per page. Hammurabi's Code

The Code of Hammurabi was one of several sets of very barbaric and harsh laws in the ancient near east where the punishment was often death. There were several earlier collections of laws that include the Code of Ur-Nammu, king of Ur (around ca. 2050 BC), the Laws of Eshnunna (around ca. 1930 BC) and the codex of Lipit-Ishtar of Isin (around ca. 1870 BC), while later ones include the Hittite laws, the Assyrian laws, and Mosaic Law. These barbaric and unrealistic codes come from similar cultures in a relatively small geographical area, and they have many of the same laws which resemble each other. They all have one thing in common, the idea that a supernatural god has somehow conveyed these laws to certain individuals.

Hammurabi's Code has been seen as an example of how even a king was not able to change fundamental actions concerning the behavior of a people in a region which was very primitive in form. The Code's provisions do not cover important areas of law and commerce. The occasional nature of many provisions indicates that the code may be better read as a codification of supplementary judicial decisions of the king and rather than being a modern legal code or constitution, it may have been used for the self-glorification of Hammurabi by attempting to memorialize his wisdom and justice. The fact remains that Hammurabi's Code was far from a code of wisdom and justice and, on the contrary, it was barbaric and extremely brutal and its copying in subsequent generations indicates that it was most unfortunately used as a model of legal and judicial reasoning.

The code of Hammurabi, consisting of 281 laws, skips the unlucky number 13, making it clear that Hammurabi was a superstitious man. The number 13 is considered unfortunate in many places, and the reasons go back to the bible. Remember, in the biblical story, Jesus had 13 disciples until one of them – Judas – supposedly betrayed him (there have been some new evidence recovered that suggest Jesus may have asked Judas to betray him and there is even more evidence and historical facts that point to the entire story being nothing more than a fable).

The idea of an Eye for an Eye stems from this code and this concept is actually referenced in many places throughout our great country. For example in the courthouse in Canton, Georgia, called **The Cherokee County Justice Center**, a reference to this concept is in a permanent setting on the courthouse wall behind a glass frame and is placed just under the Ten Commandments.
